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MESSAGE FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT MINISTER

Dear Lambeth Circuit members

I am writing this letter to you whilst thinking about the Gospel reading for Sunday February 16th – Luke 6: 17-26 – Where Jesus says 'Blessed are the poor, for yours is the Kingdom of God'. I guess we would all like to be blessed and receive blessings from God! Often our blessings appear very mixed however. Some good things are given to us – and some hard things. I certainly feel blessed with a very good blessing as I approach my marriage to Antonia in early April.

The text however says – 'Blessed are the poor, for yours is the Kingdom of God.' It is specific and not a general statement about blessings. And unless we unravel it then we may misconstrue its meaning. For we could read it that being poor is a good thing and then we would not care about all those who are actually poor in our country and around the world. I do not think any of us think that. In our circuit Brixton Hill operates a food bank service to ensure that the poor of that neighbourhood do not go hungry.

Sometimes the word blessed is translated in modern bibles as happy. I'm not sure this is a good translation. I think, even if the word blessed seems a bit old fashioned, that it is a better word in this context. If you are poor, it is hard to go around smiling when you are hungry or homeless or in debt. Let us then link the word blessed with the promise given in the text – for yours is the Kingdom (Reign or Realm) of God.

Jesus is speaking to his disciples, even though there is a crowd around him, the text is clear he speaks to the disciples. They had given up their homes and work to follow Jesus, thereby becoming poor through choice.

The early church, as recorded by Luke in the Acts of the Apostles, also suffered from poverty – and those who were rich gave up that wealth to the church. The poverty Jesus speaks of then seems to be a more voluntary choice to become poor – not to rely on worldly goods but to be followers of Jesus. Now, we see why Jesus says blessed are the poor – because they have chosen to be poor in order that they might know the reign, the kingdom of God in their lives – this reign was understood to be both an interior spirituality where one draws nearer to God – but also a community experience of sharing and caring for each other. Now they live in the reign of God and are blessed because Jesus has shown them that this way of living is more wholesome, more holy than seeking riches and prestige and so on.

When God/Jesus says 'Blessed are you' what is meant is that God favours, God delights in, those who hear the Word and do God's will. This applies to each individual believer and to each 'society/church'. If we truly wish to be blessed by God - perhaps we might say become contented (a better word than happy) - we achieve this contentedness, this peace, this wholeness, by knowing that it is living by God's way of love that leads us to that place of eternal life - not heaven after life on earth ends, but heaven on earth now, as our interior spiritual life grows and our church communities flourish in nurturing each other. In our society there are many who are poor involuntarily. There are still some Christian people who live in communities where whatever they own is shared. It was probably easier in Jesus's world to give up possessions and professions and still survive.

In our world that is very hard to do – to have a home costs money whether we buy or rent – food has to be purchased and so on. I think Jesus might give us other ways of inheriting the Kingdom – of giving ourselves over to God's reign in our lives – in this world today.

So, let us pray that God may give to each and every one of us grace to grow in holiness, in spiritual depth, in love; and enable us to look at our churches with honesty and integrity and to ask ourselves if our churches are blessed by God because we are following the Word made flesh, the Way, the Truth, the Life found in Jesus Christ our Saviour.

Revd Lena's Lent and Easter Message

As Christians, we are richly blessed with so many celebrations in the life of the Church. We have just celebrated Christmas, New Year and our Covenant Service. Some of us have put away the Christmas decorations, cards, gifts, etc. but I have noticed that in many Churches, the manger is still somewhere in the Church or vestry, the Christmas tree is in a corner waiting to be stored and the decorations lying around. Nevertheless, we are rapidly approaching the season of Lent which starts on Ash Wednesday 5th March 2025 with a 40-day-period of prayer, fasting, almsgiving and ends on Thursday 17th April 2025, also known as Maundy Thursday or Holy Thursday. This time, is often referred to as "Spring Cleaning for the Soul." Undoubtedly, Lent and Easter are ideal times for reflection, hope and new beginnings for all Christians.

As we look at the news on our televisions and read our newspapers; we realise that hardship, pain, terrorism, injustice, tragedies, war, displacement, famine, natural disasters and the senseless murders of so many young people are leaving families fearful, grieving, homeless, to name but a few of the negative effects families are experiencing. How are we meant to celebrate Easter in such difficult circumstances? At Easter, we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ and the message of the empty tomb is a sign that the Risen Lord, Jesus Christ brings us life, hope, and love. "It tells us that nothing can separate us from the love of Christ." What does Lent and Easter mean to us?

Lent

Originated from an Anglo-Saxon word, Lencten, meaning, "spring," the time of the lengthening of the days. Lent is the forty-day period beginning on Ash Wednesday and ending on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter). The period is actually 46 days, but since Sundays are feast days and to be celebrated, they are not included in the count. Lent is intended to be a period of preparation and penitence marked by fasting, praying and charity. It is a time for self-examination and a time to grow spiritually.

Purple

The Liturgical colour used in the season of Lent is Purple which signifies penitence and preparation and reminds us that this is a special time of the year and focus our attention through the events of Holy Week on to Christ's work of Redemption.

Ash Wednesday (Day of Ashes)

The Wednesday marking the beginning of the season of Lent, usually observed with a period of fasting and spiritual preparation. In the Ash Wednesday liturgy, the Minister makes a sign of the cross with ashes on a person's forehead as a mark of their mortality saying "Remember (man) that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." or "Turn away from sin and believe in the Gospel" ["good-news"]) The ashes are burned palms saved from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration.

Palm Sunday

The Sunday before Easter, where Jesus' Final and Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem is observed. Real palm branches or crosses made from palms (or both) are blessed and distributed to the congregation usually after a short procession.

Holy Week

The week preceding Easter -- the last week in Lent. Holy Week is one of the most important period of the church year, observed with many special services, beginning with Palm Sunday and concluding on Holy Saturday. Holy Week includes Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

Maundy Thursday

The word "Maundy" is originated from the Latin word called "Mandatum," which means "commandment." This day is named after Jesus' commandment to his disciples to love one another. Maundy Thursday demonstrates the importance of humility and service by remembering Jesus washing the feet of his disciples. The command is closely tied to another "Commaund" given by Jesus at the same time: "Do this in remembrance of me." Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday) was the day on which the First Lord's Supper, the Last Supper, was celebrated with the 12 Disciples.

Good Friday

The day in Holy Week in which we remember Christ's Arrest, Passion, Crucifixion and Death on a cross. It is unclear where the name "Good Friday" originated. Some have said it is a corruption of "God's Friday," Others say it is called "Good" because of the great benefits given to humanity by Christ's Death and Resurrection.

Easter Sunday


On Easter Sunday, we commemorate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, on the third day after he was crucified. Easter is a movable feast, which means it does not always fall on the same day each year. Easter is always the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox (first day of Spring). By this calculation, Easter could occur anytime from the 22nd March to the 25th April. The Easter Season, spans for 50 days (six Sundays) after Easter to Ascension Day.

We may be tempted to give in and give up the world as it is today. However, because we now share in the powerful resurrection of Jesus, we are to live our daily lives full of Easter hope. As Christians, we must never look like people who have just come back from a funeral! Death has been beaten but as disciples of Christ, and even amongst the pain and suffering, we can be filled with the light, joy, life, and the hope of the Resurrection of Jesus. Let us on Easter Sunday 20th April 2025 sing aloud our "Alleluias" and proclaim "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" Alleluia!

Wishing you and all your families and loved ones a Happy, Peaceful and Blessed Easter.

Some are in a minor key, with discordant melodies- the laments, where the Psalm writer asks the difficult "WHY" questions and entrusts his extreme sadness and grief to God. "How Long, O Lord...?" Psalms are meant to be sung during all of the seasons and shades of life.

We have all had experiences of life in a major keytimes of assurance and joy. And we have all known when life has turned into a minor key with times of distress, discouragement and sadness.

We believe that God "accompanies" us throughout our lives. God has gifted us with Christ, whom we are told sang Psalms before going to the Mount of Olives.

Our God, the great conductor of life, our Good Shepherd, walks with us in life and even through the valley of the shadow of death. During this time of Lent and Eastertide, we pray for the grace to keep singing. May we entrust our life melodies to God.
